# Eyes to See, Ears to Hear

Read the Whole Text: Mark 3-4

## Core Verses: Mark 4:

At that time Jesus came from Nazareth in Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. <sup>10</sup> Just as Jesus was coming up out of the water, he saw heaven being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. <sup>11</sup> And a voice came from heaven: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased."

<sup>12</sup> At once the Spirit sent him out into the wilderness,
<sup>13</sup> and he was in the wilderness forty days, being tempted by Satan. He was with the wild animals, and angels attended him.

<sup>14</sup> After John was put in prison, Jesus went into Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God. <sup>15</sup> "The time has come," he said. "The kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news!"

## **Gospel of Mark**

#### <u>Genre: Greco-Roman</u> <u>"Gospel" narrative</u>

Description of a person through their deeds and words, detailing their death as the final revelation of their character

#### Context

1<sup>st</sup> century Jewish/Roman world

#### Author

Strong early tradition that the author is John Mark writing in Rome around 55-65 AD. Mark is writing what he heard from Peter about the life of Jesus
